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Our Paving Our Way Through History

We are incredibly fortunate that our agency has been around for one hundred and seventy years, continuously paving the ways in serving children and families. We hope to continue for another hundred and seventy more and beyond.

1852

Cayuga Asylum for Destitute Children was founded for orphans and children whose families were unable to care for them.

1913

The name was changed to Cayuga Home for Children, and the orphanage began to also admit children receiving child welfare services.

1991

Cayuga Centers became an original **HOMEBUILDERS** agency in New York State.

1994

Services for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities implemented and Weekend Respite and Day Habilitation programs started.

2011

Cayuga Asylum for Destitute Children was founded for orphans and children whose families were unable to care for them.

2014

Cayuga Centers began working with The Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR), a program within the **United States** Department of Health and Human Services, to provide services for Unaccompanied Children (UC). Differing from other providers who offered congregate care, Cavuga Centers places UC in nurturing foster homes that allow siblings to stay together.

2020

When COVID-19 struck, Cayuga Centers kept staff employed, avoided layoffs and kept serving safely to people in their homes.

The agency grew and moved to Owasco street in Auburn, NY.

1855

The orphanage structure needed replacement. resulting in the move to 101 Hamilton Avenue in Auburn, NY. The Residential Treatment Center began.

1955

Residential Treatment Center closed as congregate care was deemed a less effective way to support children and families than treatment foster care and from home and community-based treatment services.

2008

Treatment Family Foster Care (TFFC) program in Central New York launched using Multi-Dimensional Treatment Foster Care (MTFC) model. This was the first and only evidencebased TFC in NYS.

2002

Weekend Respite and Day Habilitation programs served more than 1,200 individuals through care coordinator program. SafeCare program started.

2017

Expanded the TFFC program to Delaware.

2016

Expanded the TFFC program to Florida.

2015

Cayuga Centers celebrates 170 years by seeking to serve new areas and underserved populations.

Merged with Institute for Child and Family Services (ICFH).

2022

Cayuga Centers reached 100% vaccinated staff. Expanded the TFFC program to Pennsylvania.



Our Making a difference in the lives of youth and their families

Cayuga Centers is a nationally accredited and awarded 501(c)(3) non-profit, human services agency headquartered in Auburn, NY. Founded in 1852, the agency has delivered quality services by following the agency's mission of helping individuals and families grow as independent, healthy and productive citizens through quality counseling, out-of-home care and support services. Cayuga Centers provides a continuum of support services nationally, with 22 locations across 8 states. The agency specializes in providing individualized, culturally appropriate and trauma-informed support to diverse populations. Cayuga Centers currently serves more than 10,000 individuals and families annually, in partnership with those it serves, government agencies and other service providers.



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
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Our Services





These programs use evidence-based data to improve services and keep families together. Cayuga Centers offers these programs in Upstate New York, Delaware, and Florida.

In the 2023-2024 fiscal year, 5,962 families received support from Cayuga Centers' community-based intervention programs.



Onsite Programs

Our on-site programs promote growth and independence for individuals with diverse needs. These programs include the Youth and Family Resource Center and programs serving individuals with Intellectual and/or Developmental Disabilities (I/DD).

The Youth and Family Resource Center provides short-term stays to support youth with social and life skills while connecting families to community resources. For I/DD populations, we offer engaging after-school, evening, and weekend Respite Programs. We also offer community habilitation programs and supportive housing.



Treatment Family Foster Care

These programs are a research-informed, multitiered team approach to rebuilding family relationships. They support the diverse needs of the youth and families Cayuga Centers serves in each location.

Each youth is carefully matched to foster parents, and the treatment team develops a treatment plan specific to their individual needs.



Unaccompanied Migrant Children

Thousands of displaced children enter the United States each year, traveling thousands of miles without a parent or guardian. They are fleeing extreme poverty, violence, drug-related gang activity, sexual exploitation, and trafficking. Upon arrival, they are detained and, according to immigration law, must be placed with a federally funded agency that will provide short-term care while they transition to placement with family or other sponsors. Cayuga Centers offers transitional and long-term foster care, home study, and post-release services to this population.

Since his start in 1995, Hayes has grown Cayuga Centers from a limited program agency serving only Cayuga County to a multi-service provider operating throughout New York state, moving into Florida, Pennsylvania and Delaware. He is a prime mover in the growth of evidence-based practice. A frequent conference speaker and organizer for the initial Global Implementation Conference, he was a co-founder and the first President of Advancing Evidence-Based Practice. Hayes is a past member of New York State's Family and Children's Services Board and has a Master's in Public Administration from Russell Sage.


